Fasting and Praying

GUIDELINES FOR DANIEL FASTING

PREPARING SPIRITUALLY

Confess your sins to God. Ask the Holy Spirit to reveal areas of weakness. Forgive all who have offended you and ask forgiveness from those you may have offended (mark 11:25; Luke 11:4; 17:3-4).

PREPARING PHYSICALLY

If you have health concerns, consult your doctor before beginning a fast and explain what you plan to do. This is especially important if you take prescription medications or have a chronic ailment. Some people should never fast without professional supervision.

WHAT TO EXPECT

When you fast, your body detoxifies, eliminating toxins from your system. This can cause mild discomfort such as headaches and irritability during withdrawal from caffeine and sugars. Take time to rest. Fasting brings about miraculous results. You are following Jesus' example when you fast. Spend time listening to praise and worship. Pray as often as you can throughout the day. Get away from the normal distractions as much as possible and keep your heart and mind set on seeking God's face.

FOODS WE MAY EAT

Whole Grains: Oats, Barley

DISCIPLE

Becoming a Devoted Follower

A disciple is “a learner; a follower of Christ who learns the doctrines of Scripture and the lifestyle they require; someone catechized with proper instruction from the Bible with its necessary follow-through (life-applications).”

Jesus’ last commandment was to “GO and make disciples...” This is called the Great Commission. Many aspire to be a disciple and want to go to make disciples, but they are unsure how to do this. Jesus promised to go with us.

(Matthew 28:18-20)

How to use this devotional:

- Use it as an everyday tool to develop the habit of spending time with God and in His Word.
- Set aside time each day to work through each page.
- Find a place to spend time alone reading this devotional.
- Start by asking God to be with you and to stretch you during this time of discovery.
- Read a devotion each day, looking up the scriptures, completing the exercises, and meditating on its content.
- Get a translation of the Bible you can understand.
- Observe the different styles of Bibles and determine what helps you best understand and retain what you read. This will help you continue on once you complete this devotional.
- As you work through each day’s devotion, observe what sticks out to you. Make a point to share it with others.
- Pause occasionally to reflect, and even pray, over areas that the Lord brings as a “word” meant for you.

- Finish your devotional time with prayer. Bible study is not easy to do. You have to invest time in your growth, and some days will be easier than others. The key is developing the discipline to push through the days that aren't easy.

God really wants to spend time with you, and you should want to spend time with Him! The Bible is full of truth, and the more you know and learn, the better equipped you will be to make wise decisions.

Once you finish this devotional, take time to go back through it and see how much you have grown in the process! By starting with this simple devotional, you can establish some life changing habits that will bear much fruit.

Sharing with others

It is important you talk and share what you are learning in your daily time with God. The inspiration and hope you will bring to others will be immeasurable. The basis for writing this material is to help people grow in their walk with the Lord and equip them with the foundational tools to help lead others.

Finally

You must go and make disciples, just like you have become. You do not have a choice if you truly want to be a devoted follower of Jesus. Matthew 28:19-20 tells us, "19 Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, 20 and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (NIV)

SOAP

S.O.A.P. is a method of Bible reading and journaling. It can be used with any daily Bible reading plan. We will also be using it as part of this devotional booklet as well. After reading each devotion and answering questions, choose one Scripture from the devotion and complete the S.O.A.P. process.

S for Scripture

Open your Bible to today's reading (according to whatever plan you are following). Take time reading and allow God to speak to you. When you are done, look for a verse that particularly spoke to you that day, and write it in your journal.

O for Observation

What struck you and caught your attention in what you read? What do you think God is saying to you in this scripture? Ask the Holy Spirit to teach you and reveal Jesus to you. Paraphrase and write this scripture down in your own words.

Application

Personalize what you have read, by asking yourself how it applies to your life right now. Perhaps it is instruction, encouragement, revelation of a new promise, or corrections for a particular area of your life. Write how this scripture can apply to you today.

P for Prayer

This can be as simple as asking God to help you use this scripture, or it may be a greater insight on what He may be revealing to you. Remember, prayer is a two-way conversation, so be sure to listen to what God has to say! Now, write it

.ACTS

A.C.T.S. is an easy way to remember key elements of prayer. It's simply prayer in four parts:

A-Adoration – "Praise be to God!" -Psalms 68:35

Tell God how much you appreciate Him. Express your love for Him. Praise His power and majesty. This is a great way to begin your prayer time. You should never run out of praise. "How awesome are your deeds!" -Psalms 66:3

C-Confession – "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness." -1 John 1:9 Tell Him where you have fallen short. Be specific. Thank Him for the forgiveness you have in Christ and ask for help and strength to turn away from future temptations.

T-Thanksgiving – Always "glorify him with thanksgiving" -Psalms 69:30

You have plenty of reasons to be thankful. Thank God for His love, His faithfulness, His patience and a million other things. Express gratitude for what He's doing in your life. Thank Jesus for dying on the cross for you. Thank the Holy Spirit for indwelling you and never leaving. Thank Him for being your conscience, your counselor and that "still small voice."

S-Supplication – "Make your requests known to God." -Philippians 4:6 Tell God what you want, no matter how small it seems to you. Do you really think any of your requests are big, or too small, for God the Creator? You should have lots of intercessory prayer here.

DAY ONE

Disciple

When we choose to follow Christ, we come a disciple—a follower, a student. Just like when we follow people on social media because we want to know about them, when we follow Christ, we do it because we want to learn and know about Him. There are two main aspects of being a disciple:

1. Becoming a follower of Christ and

2. Telling others about Christ.

First, becoming a disciple means we learn God's ways. We become like Him. We learn to think with the mind of Christ, talk like Him, act like Him. Romans 12:2 tells us we have to be transformed into a new person by changing the way we think. It begins with allowing God to change our thinking. Then our actions will follow. Following Him is a simple decision, but it goes beyond just a decision. We must also grow in our faith and in our spiritual walk. That requires spending time reading the Bible and communicating with God.

Second, we share Christ with others. A good way to do that is by telling our story through normal daily conversation about what He did in us. People respond when they see the way someone once was and then see the change into what they are now. Our actions are the biggest storyteller, but we also need to use words telling that it was Christ who made the change.

3. Read Matthew 4:18-20 and Mark 1:16-20. Who did Jesus call to be his disciples and what experience was required? Do you follow others on social media or in life? What kind of things do you do to follow them? What habits could you transfer to your walk with Christ? Write down three steps you will take to grow as a disciple. Place it in a visible place as a reminder.

4. Think of someone with whom you could grow and learn by walking side by side through your journey. Write that name down and then ask him/her. Read Matthew 28:18-20. This is known as "The Great Commission." It's Jesus' last words telling us what we are to do. What was it? Was it a suggestion or command?

Think of a few people who do not follow Christ and ask God for opportunities to share your story with them.

DAY TWO

The Bible

God wrote a love letter to you, and it's called the Bible. In the Bible you'll find 66 books, divided into the Old Testament and New Testament. This love letter tells you what God is like, what His plans are for you, and what happened to some people who obeyed or disobeyed Him in the past. Reading God's word will help you get to know Him more personally, and it will show you how to live a victorious life.

As a new believer, you need God's word like a baby needs milk – you can't understand it all at once, so you need to take it in small doses that you can easily "digest" or understand. As you grow in the Word, you will be able to take bigger bites of the "meat of the word" and it will cause you to grow stronger. If the Bible is new to you, start reading about the life of Jesus in the books of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, and take a look at Psalms and Proverbs, for insight on who God is and what it takes to please Him (Open your Bible to the middle and you'll find Psalms; Proverbs comes right after it). Here's an approach to your daily meal in God's Word:

- Pray for God's guidance.
- Read some verses.
- Ask: What do these verses say? What do these verses mean? What do these verses mean to me? and
- Talk with God about what you just read and let Him talk with you.

For some extra help with Bible terms, geography, etc.,

1. Read II Timothy 3:16, 17. Where does Scripture come from? What are four purposes of God's Word?
2. Read Matthew 4:4. What confidence did Jesus Christ have in God's Word?

3. Read Hebrews 4:12: How is God's Word described? What effects does it have on us?
4. 5. Read Psalm 119:11-16: Where is the best place to put God's Word? What effect occurs when we "hide it away"?
Read Psalm 119:105: How is God's Word described? Why do we need a lamp and a light?

DAY THREE

The ABC Plan of Salvation

(What you may not have fully understood)

Salvation is as easy as ABC. You have to Admit you are a sinner, believe that Jesus died for you, and Confess Jesus as your Lord and Savior. But before you can do all that, you need to know a little more about God's plan of Salvation.

A. Admit you are a sinner. All men and women have sinned and therefore deserve the punishment of having sinned, which is both a natural and a spiritual death (Romans 6:23). The Punishment or curse for having sinned or disobeyed God's laws is three-fold. You can read about them in Deuteronomy 28:15-60. They can be summed up in three categories: spiritual death, poverty, and sickness. Look around you. Can see that the curse is rampant on the earth?

B. Believe that Jesus paid the price for your sins. We either have to pay this penalty ourselves or find someone to pay it in our place. In the Old Testament, a sacrificed lamb paid the penalty

for an individual's sins, but this was short term and had to be done over and over. God Himself came to our rescue in the form of a man named Jesus, who being God and man, became our replacement to pay the punishment for our sin instead of us. John the Baptist exclaimed, "Look, there is the lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world." (John 1:29). Galatians 3:13 says "Christ purchased our freedom redeeming us from the curse of the Law and its condemnation by Himself becoming a curse for us."

C. Confess Jesus as Lord and Savior of your life. Salvation is a free gift; it is not the result of our being good and doing right. It is not the result of obeying the Law. The purpose of the Old Testament was to show us that no one could obey the law fully and that we needed a savior. Animal sacrifices were instituted as a temporary solution and were a shadow of the permanent solution which we find in Jesus. (Romans 3:23-24)"...But the bountiful free gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord" (Ephesians 2:8). You must confess to the world who Jesus is and how He has saved you. 1. 2. 3. What are some areas of sin in your life that you have been saved from?

How did Jesus take the punishment for your sins?

What does it mean that salvation is a free gift?

DAY FOUR

Salvation

(Saved from What?)

When Jesus saved you, He redeemed you. The word redeemed means "to buy or pay off to purchase back." That is what Jesus did when He saved you from the penalty of your sin, which was the curse of death, but He saved you for so much more.

Galatians 3:13 says, "Christ purchased our freedom redeeming us from the curse of the Law and its condemnation by Himself becoming a curse for us, for it is written in the Scriptures, 'Cursed is everyone who hangs on a tree (is crucified).'"

So, what is the curse of the Law? In Deuteronomy 28:15-60 we find it is a very complex curse, but it can be summed up in three parts: spiritual death (eternity in hell), physical sickness, and poverty in every area of life not just finances. Jesus redeemed us from more than an eternity in hell, and although that would have been enough, our God, who revealed Himself to Abraham as "the God who is more than enough" or El Shaddai in Hebrew, saved us not only from death but also from a hopeless, meaningless life.

Jesus said, "I am come that they might have life and that they might have it more abundantly" (John 10:10). Prior to making this statement, Jesus revealed that the devil is a thief and he comes to steal, kill and to destroy. This clear line of demarcation reveals what the devil does and what God does through Jesus. God is not the author of our problems but the solution. He not only saved us from an eternal hell, but He also paid the price for our healing and for our needs to be met abundantly.

When you are saved, you gain so much - the ability to live a righteous life, healing for your sicknesses, and freedom from a poverty mentality. You will sin sometimes after you are saved, but you will no longer be under the control (or curse) of that sin.

DAY FIVE

Salvation Means Eternal Life

(Dealing with Doubt and Uncertainty)

Now that you've made Jesus Lord of your life, you are a new creature (2 Corinthians 5:17), and this change has taken place inside you. Your spirit has become a new creation and is born of God. Paul, who wrote two thirds of the New Testament, teaches us that man has three parts: spirit, soul and body. We are a spirit, we have a soul (our mind, will, and emotions), and we live in a body. This body allows us to live on this earth, but when our body dies, we will also be present with the Lord in heaven.

The difficulty for us now is that only one third of who we are is presently saved. Our spirits are saved, but something must be done about our souls and bodies. The Bible gives us direction on how to do this.

1. We must subdue our bodies and keep them in subjection to our spirits that desire to do God's will (1 Corinthians 9:27).
2. Our minds need to be transformed (or saved) by the renewing them with the Word of God (Romans 12:2). This is why it is important to read your Bible daily and to come to church regularly, where the word of God is preached. Only then can our spirit and soul dominate our flesh.

When we are saved, our spirit is saved instantly, our soul (mind, will and emotions) is in the process of being saved as we renew our minds with the word of God, and our bodies will be saved when Jesus returns to receive His church in the Rapture. Then we will receive glorified bodies.

Because these spiritual changes are not something we can “see” in a physical sense, we tend to doubt if we really are saved. Satan wants you to get discouraged and doubt you are now a child of God, and this is where our mind, will, and emotions become a problem. Our hearts tell us we are changed, but our mind tells we are not. When this battle happens in your life, you just need to remind Satan of the actual day you were born again and of the Scriptures that back up your experience.

DAY SIX

Salvation Confirmed

(Through a Changed Heart, His Word, by the Holy Spirit)

When we are born again there are some signs that confirm that we belong to God and that our hearts have been changed.

1. We love others. “We know that we have passed from death unto life, because we love each other. Anyone who does not love remains in death” (1 John 3:4 NIV). Our heart changes and we find it filled with love we never knew we could experience, especially toward those who have hurt us.

2. We love God’s Word. When we are born again, we will have a new love for God’s Word. “He who is of God hears God’s Words... (John 8:47a). “My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me” (John 10:27).

3. We listen to the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit, the third person of the Trinity, bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and we cry out to God as our Abba Father. Abba is the Aramaic for Daddy. "And because you are sons, God has sent forth the Spirit of His Son into your hearts, crying out, "Abba, Father!" (Galatians 4:6).

When we are saved, God confirms it to us so that we will not be filled with doubt regarding it. There will be changes in our lives that show the change in our relationship with God. We will act in ways we never would have before, and we will desire a closer, more personal relationship with the Creator of the universe. Because of this relationship, the Bible says "Let us therefore come boldly to the throne of grace that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need" (Hebrews 4:16 NKJV). God is there to help you, and when you are confused or discouraged, He will confirm your salvation and your relationship with Him by answering you when you ask Him.

DAY SEVEN

Identity

Salvation means you're in for some great news! Not only are your sins forgiven, but you receive a brand-new identity in Christ. When you give your life to Christ, His Spirit comes to live inside of you. And His identity becomes YOUR identity!

Here's what the Apostle Paul said about taking on a new identity in Christ:

"I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I now live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me" Galatians 2:20 NIV.

1. Where does Paul find his new identity?
2. What has happened to his old identity?
3. What inspires Paul to give up his old life?

Understand that when Apostle Paul speaks about being "crucified," he's not talking about the death of his physical body. He's talking about a spiritual death. With God's Spirit inside him, he is, in a sense, reborn. He has become spiritually alive with Christ as the central focus of his life.

Your salvation is just the start of your new identity. The Bible says that as you follow Christ, you must continue to die to your old sinful nature (Luke 9:23). As you do, God will miraculously change you to look more and more like Him. Colossians 3:1-3 says, "Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things. For you died, and your life is now hidden with Christ in God." Can you imagine living a life so connected with your Heavenly Father that your life is "hidden" in Him? That means when other's look at you, they will be able to see God through you! Believe this: The same power that raised Christ from the dead is within you . . . and has given you a whole new identity! (Romans 8:11).

DAY EIGHT

The New You

God has given you a fresh start! When you allowed Christ into your life, you became a “new creation” in Him. God did not just clean you up or fix the old you. He made you into something completely new.

The Bible says the old you do not exist anymore: “Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!” (2 Corinthians 5:17). You might wonder what exactly “old” refers to here. Your old self is the sinful nature into which you were born. Because of it, you were doomed. But Christ paid the price for your sins when He died on the cross for you. As a “new creation,” you are no longer a slave to sin (Romans 6:8).

Ephesians 4:22 says, “You were taught, with regard to your former way of life, to put off your old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires; 23 to be made new in the attitude of your minds: 24 and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness.” This taking off the old and putting on the new is an act of our wills. God won’t force us to do this, but He gives us the power to do it. We cannot become new without the power of the Holy Spirit, and that power only comes once we are saved and have given Jesus’ lordship and control of our lives.

Answer the following questions regarding Ephesians 4:22-24:

1. How did your old self get in the way of you becoming more like God?
2. What type of life are you capable of living as God’s “new creation?”

Be encouraged today . . . Through Christ, you are free to live a Godly life. Your past is over. And your fresh start as a “new creation” is here!

DAY NINE

The Great Exchange

The new life you received through salvation came with a heavy price tag. But Christ paid the price in full when He sacrificed His life for you (1 John 2:2). This great exchange happened, not because you were worthy of it, but because God loved you and He wanted a relationship with you. Without exchanging the life of His Son, Jesus, for your life, you would be forever lost in sin and separated from Him. That was never God's plan, but sin entered the world and caused this separation. The Bible tells us that God made a precious exchange on your behalf: "God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God" (2 Corinthians 5:21).

You are a child of God, and He wants to give you the best of the best. That's why He took away your sin and replaced it with His righteousness. Righteousness means you have right standing with God and can come boldly before Him and have relationship with Him. Because of that relationship there's more you gain. Through Christ, you are strong. Through His sacrifice, you are healthy. And because of His great love for you, you are free!

DAY TEN

The Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit is the third person in the Holy Trinity. The Bible tells us the Trinity consists of three persons: God the Father, God the Son (Jesus) and God the Holy Spirit. So, when we say “Jesus” or the “Holy Spirit,” we are really talking about God the Father as well. It may help to think about the Trinity as three roles, or personalities, but you must remember that each person in the Trinity is actually a separate person making up one God.

God the Father is the creator and ruler of everything. He is the ultimate authority in all things, even Jesus and the Holy Spirit. So, God the Father has all power and dominion.

God the Son, or Jesus Christ, is the Savior and Redeemer of a fallen mankind. It is through Jesus that we are able to be bought back from sin (or “redeemed”) and restored to relationship with God the Father. This is necessary as a Holy God cannot bear sin to be in His presence.

God the Holy Spirit was sent by God the Father, and His coming to us was made possible by the death and sacrifice of Jesus. We’re told in the Gospels that when Jesus prepared to return to heaven, He knew that we could not accomplish the tasks set out for us without power and relationship with God (Acts 1:8). So, the Holy Spirit was sent to live not only with us, but in us! He is the source of God’s power in our lives (Acts 2). He is also sent to comfort and guide us as we follow God. The Holy Spirit brings us gifts to enrich and empower us in our daily lives (1 Corinthians 12), and because of the Holy Spirit working in us, we also have godly characteristics that show up in our lives. The Bible calls these the “fruit” of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23). Ask God the Father, in the name of God the Son, to cause these gifts and fruits of the Holy Spirit to begin to come alive in you today!

1. Read Corinthians 12:8. List out the spiritual gifts. Which gift(s) do you feel you have? Read Galatians 5:22-23. List out the fruit the Holy Spirit produces in us. Which do you need to cultivate more in your life?

DAY ELEVEN

Fruit

(The Outward Sign of a New Man)

For a Christian, "fruit" is what others see in their life that reflects the image of Christ. It is pretty easy to tell an apple tree from an orange tree, the fruit is a dead giveaway. All you have to do is look at the outside. In the same way, a Christian is distinguished by the visible fruit in their life. Jesus said, "For every tree is known by its own fruit. For men do not gather figs from thorns, nor do they gather grapes from a bramble bush. By their fruit you shall know them" (Luke 6:44). Fruit is the natural outcome of God's gift of life. We will naturally produce fruit because of the new life that Christ has given us. But to produce the right fruit, fruit that reflects who God is, we have to study His word so we know what that fruit should look like. Then we have to obey His word for the good fruit to grow in our lives.

If you crush a leaf from a fruit tree, the fragrance will tell you what kind of tree it is. What "fragrance" comes from you when you go through the crushing moments of life? It should be one of the fruits of the Spirit which are the result of the Spirit of God dwelling in our lives. These fruits are given in Galatians 5:22-23: "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control."

Prayer

The Bible tells us in Matthew 6:7-9 that Jesus said to His disciples, “When you pray don’t babble on and on as people of other religions do. They think their prayers are answered merely by repeating their words again and again. Don’t be like them, for your Father knows exactly what you need even before you ask him! Pray like this....” He goes on to give the example of what is referred to as The Lord’s Prayer. Jesus said to His disciples: “When you pray...” not “If you pray,” and as believers in Jesus, we must follow His teachings. For us prayer is not an option, it is an expectation: we must pray; we need to pray! It is our lifeline to the Father.

So, what exactly is prayer? Prayer is communicating with God. It is talking to our heavenly Father, knowing He hears our prayers and will answer. It is how we submit requests (1 Timothy 2:1-3), intercession (James 5:14-15), and thanksgiving (Philippians 4:6) to a holy God. Prayer is a privilege that we have been given as God's children; it is how we come to know Him personally through our times of conversation/prayer with Him.

There are some requirements for prayer we must keep in mind. We must believe in Jesus Christ (John 14:12-14) and we must pray according to God's will (1 John 5:14), but there is no specific physical way to pray. We can pray standing (Nehemiah 9:5), kneeling (Ezra 9:5), sitting (1 Chronicles 17:16-27), bowing (Exodus 34:8), and with lifted hands (1 Tim. 2:8). Prayer is our greatest weapon against our enemy - Satan. It strengthens us in our spirit, and it is where we gain wisdom and direction for our life.

In fact, it seems promises are just meant to be broken. But in God's world, a promise is binding. It is His word, and His word never changes. His word is the Bible, and any promise made there is truth; it will not be broken by Him. There are 3573 promises in the Bible. All you have to do is accept them by faith.

1 John 2:25 – Eternal Life

Ezekiel 36:26 – New Heart

John 1:9 – Forgiveness

Luke 11:13 – The Holy Spirit

Philippians 4:19 – To Supply All Your Need

Luke 18:27 – God Can Do All Things

Psalms 103:12 – Removes Your Sins/Transgressions

Saturated in God's Word

Knowing God's Word is absolutely essential to our growth as a Christian, and the only way to know it, is to immerse and saturate ourselves wholeheartedly in it. This involves more than a five-minute devotion as we head out the door or before we lay down at night. Here are a few tips to get you started in the right direction.

Find a good study Bible. Research online, read reviews, visit Christian bookstores, ask questions, thumb through a variety of Bibles. Don't be afraid or intimidated to ask questions and have the various aspects each one offers explained to you.

Once you purchase a Bible, familiar yourself with it. Find what's included in it, how it's divided, what the symbols and abbreviations mean, where maps, cross-references, and the concordance are located, look for the history of each book and the side notes, etc. Then decide how to study the Bible and read it every day! Maybe begin with the four gospels, starting with Matthew, and include a Psalm and Proverb each day. Or read something from the Old Testament and New Testament, with a Psalm and Proverb added. This gives a good balance and brings knowledge, encouragement and practical life lessons.

Write out a plan and grow into it. Start small and increase as you go. As you read, your desire and hunger for His Word will grow in you as you grow in Him. There is no substitute for God's Word.

The Enemy

We are told in 1 Peter 5:8 to "Stay alert! Watch out for your great enemy, the devil. He prowls around like a roaring lion, looking for someone to devour" (NLT). We need to pay attention and be aware of who our enemy is. We all know what an enemy is. It's a person or entity who feels hatred for or engages in antagonistic activities against another person, an adversary or an opponent. And yes, you do have an enemy!

And he hates you and your decision to follow Jesus. He is a thief (John 10:10), a liar (John 8:44), a tempter (Matthew 4:1), and an accuser (Revelation 12:10), and He intends to destroy you and keep you from staying committed to God.

Many people today do not believe there is a devil, but they are deceived. God's word tells us there is a devil, who is also called Satan, and he is the enemy we must fight against daily. Satan was not always evil, in fact he was created by God as a cherub, a beautiful and powerful angel. He gave in to pride and rebelled against God because he wanted the worship that belonged only to God. He was thrown out of heaven, and he has been causing problems for God's people ever since. Satan's deepest desire is to cause us, God's most cherished creations, to turn against Him

and die in our sin.

Yes, there are satanic forces at work that want to cause us to reject God and live in sin, and it is only through knowing God's word (the Bible) that we are able to resist the devil (James 4:7) and live victorious lives. We are told to "put on all of God's armor so that you will be able to stand firm against all strategies of the devil" (Ephesians 6:11). So, take time to find out what that armor is and put it on.

Read Psalm 144:1-2. You will from time to time, without looking for them, without wanting them, without deserving them, walk smack dab into full-on battles. One minute, the sun shining, birds are singing, and all is right in your world....then...BAM! The enemy launches a sneak attack and you find yourself in the middle of a spiritual battle as our enemy, the devil, tries to defeat you. The devil knows that if you live in defeat, you will not be effective for God nor happy in Christ Jesus.

The Battle has been Fixed!

As a Christian, when you approach these battles in life, you have an unfair advantage. Did you know that? God doesn't have to fight fair. He already knows who is going to win! And, even better, he's shared that information with us. He tells us that He will deliver us out of ALL of us battles and afflictions (Psalms 34:19). Our enemy is already defeated; the outcome was settled thousands of years ago through Jesus' sacrifice.

You are Armed!

Knowing that we would face daily spiritual battles, God provided us with the means to fight them. He gave us spiritual armor and spiritual weapons so that we can win. Read now through Ephesians 6:10-17. Here the Apostle Paul describes the "armor of God". We're to daily put this armor on so that we will be ready when spiritual battles come our way.

You have His Strength and Power

Ephesians 6:10 tells us to be strong "in the Lord" and in the power of His might. We are not to fight these battles with our own physical or even spiritual strength, but are to use the Lord's power and His might as it rests in us through the Holy Spirit.

Fellowship

1 John 1:7 says, "But if we are living in the light of God's presence, just as Christ is, then we have fellowship with each other, and the blood of Jesus, his Son, cleanses us from every sin." Fellowship implies the sharing of common interests, desires, and motivations. It requires time be spent with others communicating, sharing and caring.

As Christians, we need to spend time fellowshiping with other Christians. This means you may have to change some of your friends. We have fellowship with God and because of that relationship we have fellowship with other "brothers and sisters in Christ." The purpose of this fellowship is to encourage and build each other up and help one another along the way. It's not a time to tear down, criticize, or become a social group. Nor does it mean we fellowship with only those who look like us, walk like us and have the same opinion as us, but we fellowship with ALL of God's people.

We are one body of Christ, and we are to treat others with honor and respect and show love in our fellowship. Sometimes we can allow our old nature to creep in and treat others with disrespect, which dishonors God. Remember everyone is created by God, and we all are on the same path. We must show love in our fellowship, just as God shows love to us when we spend time with Him.

Witness (Telling Others)

A witness is a person who gives their testimony, as in a court of law. You have probably heard the phrase, “I would like to call to the witness stand...,” and that person is asked to give testimony or evidence of something they have personally seen or heard. One of the privileges we have as a Christian is to testify to others about the goodness of God in our lives.

1 Peter 3:15 says, "Quietly trust yourself to Christ your Lord, and if anybody asks why you believe as you do, be ready to tell him, and do it in a gentle and respectful way" (TLB).

Being “ready” means we need to be prepared, and preparing takes work. You need to think about what you believe and why you believe it, so you can share it clearly from your firsthand experience.

1 Peter 3:15 also tells us “how” to witness. We are told if anyone asks, let them know in a “gentle and respectful way” what God has done for us. You are an eyewitness with firsthand knowledge of the difference God has made in your life. Share it respectfully.

Our witness helps us overcome Satan. Revelation 12:11 says, "And they overcame him by the blood of the Lamb and by the word of their testimony, and they did not love their lives to the death." Our witness also shows the world the goodness of God and what He has done for us. In Job 1:8, God called on the witness (example) of Job's life and said to Satan: "Have you considered my servant Job?" (Job 1:8). Obviously, people, including Satan, are watching how you live and serve God.

Be ready:

1. In your own words tell how God forgave your sins.

2. What are some things that are different about you since you have been forgiven?
(2 Corinthians 5:17)
 3. What has God done for you personally? (Healing, answered prayer etc.)
- Prayer: Lord, help me to be able to let others know, in a way that they can understand, the difference you have made in my life, so that they too can know the joy of having you as a friend and Savior. Amen

Acts 1: 8 says, “But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.” Rely on the Holy Spirit and you will never fail.

DAY TWENTY-THREE

Temptation

"Get you behind me Satan and don't you dare push!" It can be very frustrating dealing with Satan

and his tempting ways, but you now have the power to resist and stand firm against him. A temptation is a strong urge or desire to do something, especially something bad, wrong, or unwise. Being a Christian does not free you from temptation, but it does help you to not give in to it. Here are some key concepts about temptation you should know.

- To be tempted is NOT a sin. Jesus was tempted and yet never sinned. Hebrews 4:15 says, "For we do not have a High Priest who cannot sympathize with our weaknesses; but was in all points tempted as we are, yet without sin." We sin when we give in to the temptation.
- Temptation is a common experience. James 1:14 says, "But each one is tempted, when he is drawn away by his own desires and enticed." Every day and in many ways, we are tempted to do wrong. Tell a small lie or stretch the truth, do something when "no one" is looking, be mean to someone, give someone a piece of our mind, or not do what we know we should do, etc. All of us deal with these types of temptations.
- God will help you overcome temptation. 1 Corinthians 10:13 says, "No temptation has overtaken you except such as is common to man; but God is faithful, who will not allow you to be tempted beyond what you are able, but with the temptation will also make a way to escape, that you may be able to bear it." Hebrews 2:18 says, "Because he himself suffered when he was tempted, he is able to help those who are being tempted." Jesus taught us to pray in Luke 11:4, "And forgive us our sins; for we also forgive every one that is indebted to us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil."
- There is a great reward for those who withstand temptation. James 1:12 says, "Blessed is the man that endures temptation: for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love him." James 4:7 says, "Submit yourselves therefore, to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you."

Breaking the laws in our natural world will bring consequences to our lives and sometimes to the lives of those around us. Breaking God's laws does the same. Laws are not set up to hurt us, but rather to help us grow and mature and to keep us from getting hurt. As a new believer, you must read God's word, so you know what He expects of you. Your life is brand new now, and there are principles and commands that you must follow if you want to grow as a believer and learn to exercise self-control. God will never ask you to do something that is against His word. You don't want to slip back into your old life, and the only way to keep that from happening is to obey God, even when you really don't want to obey Him. Your mind and heart need to be renewed daily through reading the Bible if you want to be willing to do all that God asks of you.

DAY TWENTY-SIX

God's Sovereignty

Sovereign or Sovereignty are two big words that mean to most of us, "being the boss, or being in charge." The dictionary tells us that a sovereign is "one exercising supreme authority," and sovereignty means "freedom from external control; supreme excellence; controlling influence." When we apply those two words to God, sometimes we feel some inner resistance.

We want to be our own bosses. But when we come into a relationship with God, sooner or later, we need to accept the inevitable truth that God comes first in the pecking order. In other words, to experience life as God meant it for us, we must acknowledge, "God is in charge."

The Bible tells us that when the nation of Israel obeyed God, they were blessed. When they disobeyed, God did things to get their attention. That does not mean God is sitting in heaven just waiting to "zap" you if you do something wrong. He loves you and He knows what is best for you.

He set up laws not to control you, but to keep you from being hurt. When we let God have the Driver's Seat, things go better. When we have choices or major decisions to make, it's best to ask first: "God, what do You think about this? What do You want to happen in my life?" He knows everything about you, and He knows the future – you can trust Him.

Omniscience

(All knowing God)

God knows everything about us. He knows our thoughts even if we don't speak to them; He knows all about our past; and He knows exactly what we are going through today, and what is going to happen to us tomorrow or even 50 years from now. This can be scary to us at first, but the more we come to know God personally, the more we can trust His love, mercy, and grace in our lives.

Learning that God knows everything will become your greatest comfort.

DAY TWENTY-EIGHT

Omnipresence of God

(He is Everywhere)

To say God is omnipresent means He is present everywhere with His whole Being at all times. It means nothing is beyond His reach, and there is nowhere that He is not. That is a very challenging concept for our minds to comprehend because everything we see or experience, shows us that nothing can be in more than one place at a time. So, can we truly understand the omnipresence of God? We can, when we accept it by faith, believing the truth of God's word, the Bible.

In the midst of a catastrophic event, we may ask, "Where is God?" You can be assured He is there. We may question why, if God is everywhere and nothing escapes His attention, He didn't prevent it. But while everything created exists under the control of a sovereign God, He has given us free will, and we must deal with the consequences of that freedom. He is present in the midst of the tragedy and the celebration, hurting or rejoicing with us.

So, if God is present everywhere, at all times, and God created time, but is not bound by it, then obviously God created time for us because He knew we needed it to exist in our finite bodies.

He knows our needs before we do, and He is present in every aspect of our lives. Now that is a God you can trust with your life.
